The DAERA NIEA Challenge Fund 2016/17 is now open.

Schools have in the past made great use of this funding opportunity to develop their Eco-Schools projects. Outdoor learning areas, pond development and polytunnels have all been funded in recent years. We recommend that you have a look.



Do bear in mind that the turn around time from receiving funding to final spend is usually only a few months so make sure your project is deliverable in that time.

Eco-Schools NI meet New Zealand Eco-Warrior



We were thrilled last month to meet Eco-Warrior and globetrotter Maureen Howard. Maureen has been travelling overland from New Zealand to here exploring different environmental projects as she goes. Here is how she introduced herself: 'I am a Sustainability educator in Dunedin, New Zealand. As part of my activities, I run a community radio show with Otago Access Radio called Eco Living in Action on a voluntary basis. The show is aired in two New Zealand cities and has won "Most Podcast Hits" for its radio station in 2015.

'I have continued with my radio show while I have travelled to the northern hemisphere without flying in an aeroplane. So far I have travelled from NZ to Northern Ireland via freighter ships and buses where I am now staying with family.

'I am keen to profile individuals and groups in Northern Ireland who are engaged with sustainability activities here. My aim is to support individuals and organisations who are helping us transition to a sustainable future.'

Cash in with your Clobber

Schools across the country are taking part in the 'Cash for Clobber' competition run in partnership with Keep Northern Ireland Beautiful, Eco-Schools and Cookstown Textile Recyclers. This great method of being environmentally friendly by recycling also raises some welcome funds for the schools taking part - 40 pence/kilogramme.

Schools which collect the most textiles per pupil are in with the chance to win the annual 'Cash for Clobber' competition with fantastic prizes of up to £1,500. The closing date for the competition this year is 30th June 2017

Cookstown Textile Recyclers are the only BSI certified clothing recycling company that Eco-Schools recommends. Clothing collected is redistributed to developing countries around the world or recycled into industrial fibers.

Topic of the Month: Water

/ater might not seem like an obvious topic to study in Northern Ireland as we feel we have so much of it spare. However consider the facts: more than 70% of the earth's surface is covered in water, but only about 3% of that is fresh water, and only about 1% of that is not frozen, only about 0.34% is available to drink. That's like having £100 in the bank but only being able to access 34 pence of it. Water is precious resource and vital to all life on earth so we should be thinking of ways

to conserve it and look after it. Your look at the Water Topic could be focusing on saving water in school and at home, keeping our local water sources and rivers clean, if you live near the coast you could even look at marine conservation and the issues of litter and plastic in the ocean. You could also look further from home at the Global Perspective of water - what access issues do people in other parts of the orld face in regards to water?

Measuring water consumption in school can be tricky if your meter is somewhere inaccessible however Northern Ireland Water should be able to help you out with readings and are an Eco-Schools delivery partner. One school in NI started monitoring their water usage and realised they had a leak - getting this fixed saved the school thousands of pounds which would otherwise have gone unnoticed. If you are studying the water cycle in school this is a great curriculum link. Resource: Marine survey from DAERA

The autumn 2016 edition of Marine Litter Watch, the newsletter of the <u>Marine Litter Strategy</u>, is now available from the DAERA website. This is not only an interesting read but would also be a useful resource for schools studying the marine environment and litter issues.

The articles featured in this include: the experience of Kate Wilson, from the Marine Conservation Society, who promoted and took part in a challenge to give up single use plastic of a month; how Northern Ireland Water is working with schools to educate the water users of tomorrow; how a grant from the

Live Here Love Here campaign to buy a boat is helping the Lagan Rivers Trust carry out litter picks from otherwise inaccessible parts of the Lagan; the contribution Ulster Wildlife's Living Seas Programme is making to cleaning up the coast, and how Fishing for Litter is helping to change behaviour and attitudes to waste management from the fishing industry.

They were a great example of how the Eco-Schools programme benefits young people and their personal development.

Eco-Schools England -

Prime Minister, Theresa May, raised a Green Flag at a Maidenhead school and learned about the world's largest schools programme.

The Prime Minister found out first-hand about children's passion for protecting the environment as she visited St Mary's RC Primary School.

Mrs May visited the school, in her constituency, to help the children celebrate a decade of environmental action

that has seen them reduce their gas bill by 40%, reduce their waste by a third and build a greenhouse from 2,000 plastic bottles.

The Prime Minister praised the school's efforts and spoke to the children about her trip to the UN in New York earlier this week to discuss climate change and said that, although it was a 'big problem', we could all make a difference every day in small ways and the more people who did that, the more chance we had of tackling the global issue.

For the third year running, the Live Here Love Here Small Grant Scheme is open for new applications! Launched by Local Councils, the Department of the Environment, Agriculture and Rural Affairs, Tourism Northern Ireland, Choice Housing, Coca-Cola, the Northern Ireland Housing Executive and Keep Northern Ireland Beautiful, the small grants scheme provides support to schools, communities, and groups to take practical action to improve their local environment and support the growth of civic pride throughout Northern Ireland.

Grants are available from **£500 to £5,000** and are open to all schools and third level education organisations as well as volunteer and community groups, youth groups and sports clubs undertaking civic pride projects in the following Council areas:

* Belfast City Council

- * Derry City and Strabane District Council
- * Mid and East Antrim Borough Council
- * Northern Ireland Housing Executive (All Council Areas)

The Small Grants Scheme is designed to help groups improve the quality of their local environment, while contributing to the development of civic pride within a community or to enhance tourism to their community through environmental improvements. To apply, complete a simple application form detailing how your project will improve the local environment and links to the community through practical action. The deadline for applications is noon on **Monday 28th November 2016.**

Green Flag application deadlines for 2016-2017

We accept Green Flag applications at **any time throughout the year** however below are some deadlines for applications if you would like to be assessed before a certain time of the year:

- Pre-Christmas assessment: 4th November 2016
- Pre-Easter assessment: 6th January 2017
- Summer assessment (before the 23rd June): 10th March 2017

We will do our best to assess schools submitting after the suggested deadlines but may find this difficult, particularly in the summer term, which is very busy. So beat the rush and get your application in early.

Please note the preferred application method in 2016/17 is through the **School Zone online system**. Initial feed back from schools suggests this is a much improved method of submission. If you have forgotten your login please contact us.

You may, in special circumstances, <u>download</u> and submit the current paper version of the form. Outdated/old versions of the paper form may no longer be accepted.

Be sure you start using the School Zone for collecting your data and saving your Eco-Docs - Environmental Review, Action Plan and Eco-Code. These will automatically be submitted with your online Green Flag Application.
